\$500 Million to Support States that Best Prepare Young Children for Success in Kindergarten

The final application for the Race to the Top-Early Learning Challenge is now available for state-level competitive grants to improve early learning and development programs. In order to compete for these funds, states must have an early learning advisory board. Unfortunately, as part of the May revise budget, the Early Learning Advisory Council (ELAC) is among the dozens of boards and commissions to be eliminated in California. Updated Norovirus Outbreak Management and Disease Prevention Guidelines from CDC

Noroviruses are the most common cause of epidemic gastroenteritis, responsible for at least 50% of all gastroenteritis outbreaks worldwide. Since the virus can be transmitted by food, water, and contaminated environmental surfaces as well as from direct person to person, and because there is no long lasting immunity to norovirus, outbreaks affect people of all ages and can occur nursing homes, hospitals, and schools and child care programs.

Protect Against Flu and Whooping Cough Poster

Adults who have or who anticipate having close contact with an infant less than 12 months old (e.g., parents, siblings, grandparents, child-care providers and healthcare providers) and who previously have not received Tdap should receive a single dose of Tdap to protect against pertussis. Annual Flu Vaccine is also recommended for caregivers.

Policy Statement Supports Eliminating Personal Belief Exemptions from Immunization Requirements

National Association of County & City Health Officials (NACCHO) recently issued a policy statement "Eliminating Personal Belief Exemptions from Immunization Requirements for Child Care and School Attendance" The policy statement takes this position to reduce the incidence of vaccine-preventable diseases, protect those who cannot receive vaccine due to age or medical condition, and protect those at greater risk of severe complications. http://www.naccho.org/advocacy/positions/loader.cfm?csModule=security/getfile&PageID=204056

Kidsdata Information about Children Ages 0-5 with Elevated Blood Levels

Among children screened for lead poisoning, the number of children in California ages 0-5 with confirmed elevated levels has gone down since 2007. In 2009, 2,426 California children ages 0-5 had elevated levels of lead. A blood lead level of 9.5 or greater is considered elevated, but adverse health effects can occur at much lower concentrations. Healthier Food Options Lead to Healthier Kids

A report from UCLA Center for Health Policy Research creates a Retail Food Environment Index to rank counties on the density of fast food versus healthy food options, and lists the results by county. Nevada County has the healthiest retail food mix while Sutter County has the least healthy selection. Among more populous counties, Sacramento ranks at the bottom when it comes to providing healthy choices.
